
Total Paid and Incurred by Fiscal Year - Police Department

Top 5 Part of Body - Police Department







What Happens When An Employee Is Injured

- Employee responsibility
 - Reports injury to supervisor, manager or HR
 - Notice of representation

- Employer responsibility
 - Refer the employee to the medical facility
 - Call 911 if emergency care needed, otherwise refer to occupational clinic
 - Complete the injury paperwork, gather information
 - DWC-1 claim form must be provided within 24 hours of knowledge
 - Report the claim to LWP Claims Solutions

Workers' Compensation Benefits

- Medical Benefits:
 - Coverage for treatment, hospital stays, and prescriptions
- Lost time Benefits:
 - Temporary Disability (TD)
 - 4850 (Safety personnel)
 - Temporary partial/Wage loss
- Permanent Disability (PD) Benefits
- Supplemental Job Displacement Benefits (SJDB)
- Death Benefits

POLICE RISK MANAGEMENT GRANT FUNDS

ACTION ITEM

ISSUE: The Police Risk Management Grant Funds Historic Usage Report is attached to ensure members are aware of the available grants for their agencies. Members are encouraged to share their use of the funds and provide suggestions for funding going forward.

The committee annually requests funding for the grants. The grant amount has been \$50,000 since 14/15, the Board approved an increase to \$100,000 effective 7/01/2024. Program administrators are comfortable keeping funding at \$100,000 for the upcoming year if no objections.

RECOMMENDATION: Provide feedback and direction regarding grant program for FY 25/26.

FISCAL IMPACT: To be determined.

BACKGROUND: The Board approved a FY 14/15 budget of \$50,000, this grant amount was originally set aside for the purchase of body-worn cameras. Since then, once a body camera program is fully funded the member agency has the option to use the funds for other safety and risk management uses such as data storage for body cameras, ballistic vests, vests with load bearing carriers, and officer wellness and fitness. The annual grant fund amount was increased to \$100,000 for FY 24/25.

WELLNESS DISCUSSION

First Responder Wellness

ISSUE: Seeking mental and behavioral health treatment for first responders can feel overwhelming and first responders may question if their experiences and stressors are severe enough to seek help.

RECOMMENDATION: Utilize First Responder Wellness to treat PTSI, addiction, alcohol, anxiety, and depression.

FISCAL IMPACT: None expected at this time.

BACKGROUND: First Responder Wellness carefully designs programs to help public safety professionals recover from trauma while increasing their overall well-being. They are committed to providing confidential, trusted, and effective treatment. This approach ensures that clients will have safe transitions back to their careers and personal lives.

They use a comprehensive approach to treatment and believe in incorporating family systems support. First Responder Wellness provides trauma-based mental health treatment designed by experienced and culturally competent professionals.

WEST COAST POST-TRAUMA RETREAT (WCPR)

WCPR is for first responders whose lives have been affected by work experiences. It is a residential program providing treatment, education, and peer support designed to help current and former first responders recover from work-related stress, including post-traumatic stress injury (PTSI).

WCPR is offered in California, Washington, Oregon, Kansas, and Indiana.

OVERVIEW OF THE PROGRAM

Through intensive debriefing and peer support over 6 days, first responders at WCPR retreats work through traumatic experiences, learn to understand their reactions, and develop skills to deal with painful memories and new critical incidents. They leave the retreat with new insights, positive coping skills, a focus on resilience, and a new peer support network. Volunteer staff includes two clinicians, up to 12 first responder peers, and a nondenominational chaplain. Retreats are limited to only 6 clients.

HOW TO KNOW IF WCPR IS RIGHT FOR YOU

If you are experiencing depression, anxiety, isolation, suicidal thoughts, sleep problems, relationship stress, work difficulties, the loss of a spouse or partner, addiction issues, or are having trouble coping with daily activities, WCPR may be able to help even if previous counseling and/or medication didn't.

If you would like to attend WCPR, call for an initial 30 minute intake interview to determine if the retreat is a good fit for you. Call (415) 721-9789 to speak with the Intake Coordinator.

WHO WE ARE

Our programs are staffed by experienced first responder partners, mental health clinicians and chaplains, specifically trained in trauma recovery.

Peers, clinicians, and chaplains volunteer their time while participating in the retreats. Clinicians close their practice for a week, peer support members spend vacation, comp time, or trade shifts, taking time away from their families, and chaplains take time off of their jobs. Why do all of these people give of their time? Because they 'get it' and they care. Our staff and volunteers are committed to diversity, equity, inclusion and belonging in our work and offer a brave space for every First Responder and partner.

ABOUT US

NCCSIF, a Joint Powers Authority, was first formed in early 1979. It is one of the first pooled municipal insurance programs in California. The JPA's purpose is to provide median Northern California Cities a mechanism to self-fund a layer of workers' compensation insurance, as well as to obtain the advantages of group purchase excess insurance. In 1981, a number of the member Cities desired to apply the same concepts of pooling to automobile and general liability coverage.

In 1987 the name of the Joint Powers Authority was changed to Northern California Cities Self Insurance Fund (NCCSIF). NCCSIF now also offers group purchase of property, crime and employee assistance programs (these are not self-insurance programs). Membership has grown over the years to now include twenty two (22) Cities.
